

Twelfth Generation

Rev. Thomas Mallory (Reverend Thomas¹³, Sir William¹⁴, William¹⁵, Sir John¹⁶, William¹⁷, John¹⁸, William¹⁹) was born in England August 23, 1605 to the Rev. Thomas Mallory and Elizabeth Vaughn.

He was baptized in Devenham, County Chester, England, August 27, 1605. Cannon of Chesire. He enrolled at New College, Oxford, 15 October 1624. He received a B.A. 7 May 1628 and an N.A. 17 January 1631/2. He was appointed the rector of Essington, Oxford, 1632. The Cromwellians removed Thomas as rector because he was a Royalist, remaining loyal to Charles I. After the restoration of the monarchy, Charles II appointed him to his father's former place of Dean of Chester, 1 December 1660.

Thomas married three times and was the father of six children, two of whom were emigrants to Virginia. In his will he identified his wife as Frances to whom he bequeathed £400 for life.

Rev. Thomas Mallory had the following child:

Rev. Thomas Mallory died September 8, 1671 in Brindle, Lancaster County, England, at 66 years of age.

Maj. John Lewis (John Lewis¹³ Pricket, Lewis Rycketts (ap¹⁴ Richard), Richard¹⁵ Lewis_) Major John Lewis, born 1635, was a member of the House of Burgesses.

He married twice. He married **Mildred Lewis**. She was the daughter of Col. Robert Lewis and Jane Meriwether. He married **Isabella Warner** in 1666. She was the daughter of Col. Augustine Warner and Mary Towneley.

Major Lewis and Isabel are said to have been the original settlers of "Warner Hall", the place being named in honor of Isabella Warner. Augustine Warner took uplands on Planjitanck and later the tract on which Warner Hall stands in Robin's Neck, therefore through this marriage it seems probable that the Lewises acquired "Warner Hall." The house is said to have originally contained 40 rooms. Mr. Joseph Bryan of Richmond City and Eagles Point, Gloucester County told me that the house was burnt in 1849, was the oldest colonial house existing in Virginia. In this fire the center brick house was destroyed, leaving a smaller detached house at either end intact. The Clarks who owned the place at the time of the fire placed a wooden house on the site of the original brick center part of the old home. This frame house was later removed, and a beautiful Colonial wooden building placed between the brick wings by R.P. Cheney, making an interior full of comfort and charm. The living room and dining room are baronial in size and furnishings and the view from an upper room down a magnificent avenue of trees is after the order of an English house. The house is set in a beautiful lawn, which falls to the Severn at the back and touches the main road in front,

which road taps the highway from Gloucester point and cuts Robin's Neck in two.

Maj. John Lewis and Isabella Warner had the following child:

Col. Augustine II Warner (Col. Augustine¹³) was born in Gloucester, Virginia June 3, 1642 to Col. Augustine Warner and Mary Towneley. Col. Warner was educated in England. He inherited Warner Hall on the Severn River in Gloucester Co.

He married **Mildred Reade** (Lt. Col. George¹³, Lt. Col. Robert¹⁴ Read, Andrew¹⁵ Reade_) around 1666. She was born in Williamsburg, Virginia October 2, 1643. She was the daughter of Lt. Col. George Reade and Elizabeth Martiau.

They settled in Chesapeake and lived there many years. He was Speaker of the House of Burgesses 1676-7 and member of the Council 1676-7. He was a strong supporter of Governor Berkeley and a Royalist and had his house plundered by Bacon's men.

Col. Augustine II Warner and Mildred Reade had the following children:

5. Mildred Warner was born in Warner Hall, Gloucester Co. VA 1670. Mildred died March 26, 1701 in Whitehaven, Cumberland, England. She married twice. She married George Gale. He was the son of George Gale. He married Jane Butler. She married Capt. Lawrence Washington 1688. Capt. Washington was born in Bridges Creek, Westmoreland Co. VA September 1659. He was the son of Col. John Washington and Anne Pope. He married Mildred Reade. Capt. Washington died February 1698 in Warner Hall, Gloucester Co. VA.

Col. Augustine Warner died June 19, 1681 in Warner Hall, Cumberland, Virginia, at 39 years of age. He is buried at Warner Hall.

His widow, Mildred Reade remarried. She married **Capt. Lawrence Washington** in 1688. He was born in Bridges Creek, Westmoreland Co. VA September 1659, the son of Col. John Washington and Anne Pope. Mildred died October 20, 1686 in Warner Hall, Cumberland, Virginia, at 43 years of age. Her body was interred October, 1686 in Cumberland, Virginia. Capt. Washington died February 1698 in Warner Hall, Gloucester Co. VA.

Lt. Col. John Walker (Maj. Thomas¹³) birth date unknown. He married **Rachel Croshaw** (Capt. Richard¹³) in 1692. She was born in York County.

Maj. Francis Thornton (William Thornton¹³, William Thornton¹⁴, William Thornton¹⁵, William Thornton¹⁶, William Thornton III¹⁷, Robert Thornton¹⁸, William Thornton Jr.¹⁹, Thomas Thornton²⁰, William Thornton²¹) was born November 5, 1651. He was a member of the House of Burgess. He died in 1726 at age 75.

He married Alice Savage in 1675. **Alice Savage** (Captain Anthony Savage, John Savage¹⁴) was born abt. 1661.

Nicholas Merewether was born 1631 in Kent County, England. He emigrated in 1650 from Kent County, England to colonial Virginia. He resided at "The Island House" between 1656 and 1678, Jamestown Island, Virginia with 80 acres of land. Nicholas served as Clerk of the Quarter Court and Governor's Council of the Colony of Virginia and Jamestown. He married **Elizabeth Woodhouse** in 1656 (probably). She was born abt. 1638.

(Robert¹³Taliafero) was born in 1656 in Gloucester, VA. He married **Sarah Smith** (Col. Lawrence¹³Smith) in 1682. She was born on 1 January 1660/61. She was baptized on 8 January 1660/61 at Hull Parish, Yorkshire, England.

Col. John Taliafero died June/July 21, 1720, in Essex, VA. Sarah died in 1720 at Westmoreland, VA.

Captain James Pendleton (Major Brian¹³, Edward¹⁴, Rev. Edward¹⁵, Thomas¹⁶, Henry¹⁷, Thomas¹⁸) born 1627 (England?) died November 29, 1709 in Westerly, RI.

Went to Watertown, Mass., with parents from England. They moved to Sudbury, and he was given 140 acres of land by his father. Moved to Portsmouth, N.H., where he was in business with his father. There he was a selectman, 1663 to 1668; town clerk, 1663 and 1664; one of the commissioners (local magistrates) to determine small actions from 1667 to 1671, and captain of the Portsmouth military company from 1666 until 1674, his last year in Portsmouth. He owned property on the Great Island and continued in business after his father moved to Winter Harbor (Saco), Maine, in 1665.

He moved to Stonington, Conn., being granted land, and also had some 700 acres of land given him by his father. Those 700 acres are in what is now Westerly, Rhode Island, but both Connecticut and Rhode Island once claimed the Westerly area. (The land was given him in trust, with instructions it be passed on to his children by his second wife.)

James, a staunch Puritan, favored Connecticut over the more liberal Rhode Island, but he eventually lost that fight. He continued his business activities and was affluent enough to be referred to as "Esquire" and "Gentleman."

He was a selectman in both Stonington and Westerly, sold intoxicants, imported sugar from Barbados and had dealings with tobacco planters in Maryland. Dealing in liquor was not considered reprehensible in those days, and a man could engage in that business, as well as in politics, and still be a community leader and a pillar of the church.

About the time he moved to Stonington, the King Philip's War broke out, and Capt. James took part. He also may have participated in the great Narragansett fight. He was

awarded land in Voluntown for his services during the war. He also obtained captive Indians whom he sold into slavery. Eventually, James obtained more property in Rhode Island, buying 1,000 acres at Watch Hill in Westerly. His Watch Hill home still stands. It is unclear when he moved from Stonington to Westerly.

BRIAN PENDLETON AND HIS DESCENDANTS, 1599-1910, Compiled by Everett Hall Pendleton, Privately Printed MCMX, found in the DAR Library, Washington, DC. Page 1-77.

Capt. James Pendleton, was born in England about 1627, or 1628, as indicated by the facts that he was admitted freeman at Watertown, Mass., 10 May 1548, and that on the 26th of July 1672, he testified at Portsmouth, NH, he was forty-four years of age.

On the 21st of Oct 1650, James Pendleton and Mary, his wife, of Watertown, Mass., sold to George Parkhurst, "Same town" five or six acres known as "crooked meadow" (Middlesex Co., Mass., Deeds, I, 17). Shortly afterwards he removed to Sudbury, Mass., where he served on a coroner's jury in May, 1654.

In 1671, James began to dispose of the property he had accumulated at Portsmouth and vicinity, with his wife, Hannah, he sold land and buildings at Portsmouth to Thomas Thatcher.

On the 25th Jany. 1688, James Pendleton bought of Nathaniel Lynde 1,000 acres on the sea-coast of Westerly, including Watch Hill. He sold a small part of this land and the rest he willed to his sons, Joseph, Edmund, and Caleb.

His death occurred in Westerly on the 29 Nov, 1709. Like his father he was active in public affairs until the time of his death and like his father too, wherever he went he became at once one of the leading citizens.

The will of James Pendleton, names wife, Hannah, sons: Joseph, Edmund and Caleb, daughters Ann Borwn, Eleanor Pendleton and Dorothy Pendleton, "children by my present wife, Hannah," and daughters Mary and Hannah "had by my former wife."

Capt. James Pendleton married **Hannah Goodenow** (Capt. Edmund¹³, Thomas¹⁴, John¹⁵, Robert¹⁶, Ambrose¹⁷) born November 28, 1639 in Sudbury, Middlesex County, MA. Died April 5, 1688 in Stonington, New London Co. Connecticut.

Henry Hall (John III¹³, John¹⁴, John¹⁵, Thomas¹⁶, William¹⁷, Nicholas¹⁸, Thomas IV¹⁹, Thomas²⁰, Thomas²¹, William²², Reginald²³, Thomas²⁴, Roger²⁵, Warin²⁶) born 1637 in Misquamicut, Washing County, RI, died November 5, 1705 in Westerly, RI.

Early records show Henry Hall was a member of early 7th-Day Baptist Church in America, as were his descendants.

17 Sep 1679, Henry took oath of allegiance in Newport, in 1687 he served on grand jury, & in 1691 he was deputy. He was weaver by trade, as was his son Henry. It is speculated that his wife's 1st name was Honor, as his son James named his 1st dtr Sarah aft his wife, his 2nd dtr Jane aft his wife's mother, & his 3rd dtr Honor, presumably aft his mother. Jan 19 1664 Richard Knight made in partnership w/Henry Hall (most likely w/assistance of Job Babcock who was Indian interpreter), great purchase from Indians of lands at Chippachog, in Westerly, which they called Westerly Manor. This area was known as Misquamicut, & Kingston, which was afterwards known as Hall & Knight Purchase. Job was new son-in-law, as of 1662, of Elder John Crandall & Mary Opp, & would be 30 yrs later f-in-law of Henry's son, James.

Abstracts from vol 1 of RI Land Evidences, in State Archives, p 3, "Narragansetts in Colony of Rhod-Island ... have for. Tenn pownds in peage 8 the peny in hand by me the aforesaid Cogamaquoant Received from Richard Knight & Henry Hall both of the Towne of Newport wherwith I the sayd Cogamaquacant doe discharg the said Richard Knight & Henry Halls of all debts. I doe. . .sell. . unto the said Richard Knight & Henry Halls their heires.... a certain percell of Land Scittuate and lyinge in the aforesaid Narraganse-tts Cuntry neere or adjoininge unto the Land Formerly Sould by me unto Mr. John Porter & Mr Samll Wilbore &c at pettacomscutt & is by Esteemation 2 Miles Square be it more or less being butted & bounded as Followeth Vizt. on the Eastside from a place called in Indian Qumatumpick, southward to a place called chippachuat & soe westerly to a place called Quowachauk & from thence northward to place called Winatompick & so to extend from thence upon a straight line unto the 1st boundery to be Houlden of our Royall Soverraigne lord Charles the Second not in Capett nor by Knights service but in comon Soccage after the manner of East Greenwich in the County of Kent. Further I the said Cogamoquant doe bind myself in the sum or Bond of 500 pounds Starl of good and lawfnl mony of England or to the vallew therofthat the land mentioned in this deed is a good Reall & firme Estate unto the said Richard Knight & Henry Halls & that the said land is ceere & free from all intailments deeds of sale leases mortgages & all other alienation of what nature or kinds whatsoever & to deere & remove or cause to be removed at or before the 1st of March next after the date hereof Every Indian or Indians Inhabiting there on & not to suffer or the future any Indian to dwell or plant upon the aforesaid Tract. . .this 19th day of Jan & in the yeare of our lord god 1664... in pressence of John Archer, The marke of Alse Archer, Richard Bulgar, the marke of Cogamagoant, the marke of Wotomer, an Indian Cobsounk, his mark, an Indian."

In 1676, Henry Hall & John Knight rendered svc to Colony in King Philip's War, & Oct 31 1677, they were granted land in East Greenwich for svc in that war. Each grantee recd 100 acres. Henry was abt 38 during King Philip's War & John Knight was most likely abt age 58, which is based on fact he had been married prior to his arrival in MA c1637. In "Halls of New England", by David Brainard Hall, Henry Hall is mentioned as son of John Hall of Newport, RI. He states, "Henry Hall Sr weaver & Henry Hall Jr took oath of fidelity Sep 17 1679 & also James Hall was free inhabitant of Westerly, 1680." Henry Hall & 4 others, purchased 2 May 1710, 3200 acres of land north of Pawtucket Riv & west by Wood Riv. Amg grantees of land near last purchase in 1710-11, were John Hall, Edward Hall, Henry Hall, & Joseph Hall in 1709.

Henry Hall Jr m Constant. He made his will Nov 1 1716 in which he mentioned sons William, Elisha, Henry, James, John, Edward, & dtrs Susannah, Lydia, Elizabeth Button, Cherry (or Mercy) Cottrel stating Mary & Martha were not of age. (See New Eng Historical Genealogy Register, vol 15). 28 Sep 1705, Henry Hall's will, proved 5 Nov 1705, executor not named, so Town Council appointed his son Edward to that office. To wife, 1/3 all estate real & personal, at her disposal, & son Edward to take care of her. To son Edward, 1/3 all land & movables. To all children, 1/3 estate divided equally. To eldest son Henry, 5 shillings. Children all to take

care of my wife, their aged mother. Codicil gives son Henry, 1/2 certain tract of land. Inventory 204 Lbs, 4 shillings, viz. 15 sheep 10 lambs, 2 oxen, 10 pigs, 7 swine, 2 mares, 35 loads hay, 1 loom, 2 guns, a cutlass, 5 cows, 2 calves, 6 horses, 4 mares, also 12 mares & horses, 4 colts, pair of oxen, bull, 13 steers, 2 heifers, warming pan, &c. Appointment of son Edward as executor was asked for by following bros & bros-in-law, viz: Henry, James & John Hall, Thomas Stevens, & James Adams. In 1706, in this & following yr receipts were given to executor by bros & bros-in-law as follows, viz: Henry, John, & James Hall, Thomas Stevens, James Adams, & Edward Larkin. Oath was also made by John Hall & William Wilkinson, that widow had recd her portion.

Henry Hall married **Honor Content** born 1636 in Westerly, RI, died November 5, 1705 in Westerly, RI. Henry and Honor had the following children:
