The Umfravilles were a family of great distinction and antiquity, having first settled in the north of England at the time of the Norman Conquest, when they received the liberty of Redesdale in Northumberland. Thomas's great-grandfather, Gilbert Umfraville, was elevated to the earldom of Angus by Edward I, although his descendants retained the title for less than a century because of the failure of heirs male in the main line. Thomas himself belonged to a cadet branch of the family, and thus benefited directly from a series of entails of property made by his uncle, Gilbert, the 3rd earl, who died in 1381 without surviving issue. Much earlier, in the summer of 1364, Earl Gilbert had settled his manor and castle of Harbottle and manor of Otterburn,

together with their extensive appurtenances in Northumberland, first upon his only son, Sir Robert (who died without issue four years later), and then with successive remainders upon his half-brothers, Robert and Thomas. The earl confirmed this arrangement by a deed of February 1378, which now included his young nephew, Thomas Umfraville the younger, the subject of this biography. In the event, Thomas and his father were destined to enjoy a substantial inheritance, for Robert Umfraville, Thomas's uncle, died childless in the following year. Thomas Umfraville the elder immediately succeeded to Robert's manors of Edmondsley and 'Farnacres' together with holdings in Gateshead and Ravensworth in the palatinate of Durham; and on the earl's death, not long afterwards, he duly took possession of Harbottle and Otterburn as well. Since he had also come to occupy the manor of Wheatley, the adjoining vill of Holmside (near Edmondsley) and land in the environs of Durham, together with the Umfraville manor of Hessle in Yorkshire (given to him by his half-brother, the earl, in 1377) and other properties in and around the Northumbrian villages of Whelpington and Alwinton, Thomas now commanded a prominent position among the northern gentry. To be sure, part of his inheritance remained temporarily as dower in the hands of Gilbert's widow, Maud, although her marriage to Henry Percy, 1st earl of Northumberland, in 1383, brought some compensation in the way of a new and powerful family connexion.

By the time of his father's death, in May 1387, Thomas Umfraville the younger had already served on at least one royal commission of gaol delivery at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and had, moreover, been made a knight. Some doubt exists as to his precise age, but he was probably about 24 when, in the following summer, the escheators of Yorkshire and Northumberland were ordered by the Crown to give him custody of his patrimony. By then he possessed the resources to offer joint sureties of £1,000 on behalf of his neighbour, Sir Henry Heton, who was being sued by another Northumbrian landowner. One year later, Sir Thomas performed a similar service for Richard Clifford, the future bishop of Worcester (1401) and London (1407). Sir Thomas's readiness to stand bail for Clifford, then a clerk of the chapel royal, and for Nicholas Blake, dean of the chapel, on their release from prison is particularly interesting, since the two men belonged to a group of Richard II's servants who had been consigned to the Tower at the instigation of the Lords Appellant and only discharged on 4 June 1388, the very last day of the Merciless Parliament. As a Member of this assembly, where he was representing Northumberland for the first time, Sir Thomas must have been a party to the trial for treason of King Richard's most unpopular favourites as well as to sustained attacks on the court party in general, although he evidently felt some sympathy for the victims of the Appellants' wrath.

As soon as the parliamentary session ended, Sir Thomas hastened back to the border, where he was ordered to ensure the strict observance of the existing truce with the Scots, who were only too anxious to exploit England's

political divisions by launching an invasion on the slightest pretext. The expiry of the truce on 19 June 1388 gave them an ideal opportunity to strike, and just over a fortnight later the earl of Douglas inflicted a crushing defeat on the English at Otterburn. Sir Thomas, whose own estates lay in the path of the advancing enemy, was himself present at the battle, although he escaped the fate of his new kinsman by marriage, Sir Henry Percy ('Hotspur'), who was captured by the Scots. His subsequent appointment as sheriff of Northumberland and keeper of the strategically vital castle of Roxburgh on the Scottish march, no less than his membership of royal commissions for the improvement of defences and discipline at the other important English strongholds of Bamburgh and Berwick-upon-Tweed, reflect the government's anxiety over the vulnerability of the north to attack, and its desire that defensive measures should be executed by energetic and able men. By December 1389, Sir Thomas had also begun to serve on diplomatic missions to Scotland, and he was later instrumental in smoothing the way towards more constructive talks for peace. His second return to Parliament, in January 1390, further confirms that his influence in the north was growing steadily, although his early death, on 12 Feb. 1391, bought an abrupt end to his promising career.

Sir Thomas left five daughters and a son, named Gilbert, who was born and baptized at Harbottle on 18 Oct. 1390, and was thus only a few months old when his father died. In early March 1391, Edward, earl of Rutland, secured the wardship and marriage of the young heir, only to lose it again a few months later when Ralph, Lord Neville (later earl of Westmoreland), had the grant changed in his own favour. The boy made a suitable husband for Neville's daughter, Anne, to whom he was betrothed in childhood. The death of Maud, countess of Northumberland, in December 1398, left Gilbert heir to her dower properties in Otterburn and Harbottle, as well as the lordship of Kyme and other estates in Lincolnshire, which, to Neville's chagrin, were placed first in the custody of the Percys and then, after their fall, in 1403, were shared between the late Sir Thomas's younger brother, Sir Robert Umfraville KG, and George Dunbar, earl of March, as joint guardians. Like his father and his uncle, Sir Robert (who became deputy admiral of England), Gilbert showed great promise as a commander. After distinguishing himself in a series of campaigns against the French, he was killed at the battle of Baugé in March 1421, just a few months after the death of his widowed mother, Agnes. Since he left no issue, the family estates were partitioned between his five sisters and their husbands.

Amongst the benefactors to the Parish Church of Eccles in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries the Booths of Barton occupy perhaps the first place. A few of their benefactions have been mentioned, and in addition to these, it is certain there were many minor ones of which no record has survived. In addition to this, the family played a very important part in the social life of the community, being extensive land holders and occupying the position of lords of the manor. It is, therefore, necessary that something more than a passing reference should be made to them.

The family was really a branch of the family of Booth of Boothstown, Worsley, the first Booth of Barton being John de Booth, who married Loretta, who was daughter and sole heiress of Agnes de Barton. Agnes de Barton was descended from Edith de Barton, daughter of Albert Grelle, or Greslet, who was the fourth Baron of Manchester.

The first Lord of the Manor of Mamecestre, or Manchester, was also Albert Greslet, who, as a favourite of Roger de Poitou, probably occupied a high position at the Courts of William I and William II. It is thought that he received the grant of the Barony of Mamecestre about 1086, and, until the death of Thomas, the eighth Baron, in 1310, the Barony continued in the hands of the Greslets. Thomas, having no male issue, left the Barony to his sister Joan, who had married Sir John de la Warre, Baron of Wickwar, County Gloucester. Albert Greslet the Younger, as the fourth Baron is often called, died in 1182, and was succeeded by his son, Robert. His daughter Edith married Gilbert, son of William

de Notten, of Yorkshire, in 1190. Included amongst the lands paying knights' fees in the County of Lancaster in the opening decade of the thirteenth century were those of Gilbert de Notten, who held in the right of his wife (Edith de Barton) "fourteen oxgangs of the Lord the King in Thanage, for which he paid 26s. annually."

John de Booth, by marrying Loretta de Notten, became Lord of the Manor of Barton, the family becoming known as the Booths of Barton. His son Thomas was the founder of the first chantry in the Eccles Parish Church, and also endowed the chantry of Salford Bridge. Of his three sons, one, **John, married Joan Trafford, of Trafford**, another, Robert, became Sheriff of Cheshire, died in 1460, and is buried in Wilmslow Churchyard; and his eldest son, Thomas, succeeded to the Barony.

Robert de Booth, the Sheriff of Cheshire, married Dorice, daughter and co-heir of Sir William Venables, and their son, Sir William Booth, married Matilda, daughter of John Dutton. Their son George succeeded to the title and estates, which passed to his son William, who married Margaret, daughter and heir of Sir Thomas Assheton, of Ashton-under-Lyne, from whom descended the Earls of Stamford and Warrington, owners of great estates at Ashton-under-Lyne and Dunham Massey. Dunham Park belongs to the family, and Dunham Hall is one of the residences of the present Earl. It will thus be seen that, although the direct male line of the Booths of Barton died out, the name survives in a family notable in the pages of the annals of our English nobility.

The direct line of the Booths of Barton may now be traced in brief. The Thomas del Bothe, elder brother of the Sheriff of Cheshire, succeeded to the Barony of Barton. He also married a member of the family notable, among other matters, for having produced the Black Knight, a title of derision applied to Sir Ralph Assheton, whose name and deeds are celebrated annually at Ashton-under-Lyne on Easter Monday by the function of the "Riding of the Black Knight." Their son, Sir John Booth, was killed at the battle of Flodden Field. He was succeeded as Lord of the Manor of Barton by his son John, the last heir in direct descent, who died in 1576. Dying without male issue, his properties and estates were inherited by his two daughters.

One of these married George Legh, of High Legh, Cheshire, who succeeded thereby to the Barton estate. The fact is noted in the street list of the borough, and Legh Street, Patricroft, serves to remind that nearly three and a half centuries ago the right of the Lord of the Manor of Barton, held for about two centuries by the Booths in succession to the Bartons of Barton, the male heirs of which family had died out about the middle of the fourteenth century, passed over to a well-known Cheshire family. Another daughter of the last of the Booths of Barton married Sir Edward Trafford, taking with her certain lands which adjoined the Trafford estate; and from the marriage succeeded the direct line of the Traffords of Trafford.

The William de Bothe who has been previously mentioned as a benefactor to the Parish Church, and who, amongst many important appointments, held the high position of Lord

Chancellor of England, was the third son of Sir Thomas de Bothe; and Laurence de Bothe, who also was a benefactor to the Church and who also became a Lord Chancellor of England, was half-brother to William de Bothe, the father having married firstly Joan, daughter of Sir Henry Trafford, and secondly Maud, daughter of John Savage, of Clifton. There must surely be few parallels to the half-brothers in the holding of one of the highest positions in the State.

Bonville was knighted before 1417 during the campaigns in

France of King Henry V. He was Knight of the Shire for Somerset in 1421, and for Devon in 1422, 1425 and 1427. In 1423 he was appointed by the king as Sheriff of Devon. He was Seneschal of Aquitaine at various times from 1442 to 1453, and Governor of Exeter Castle from 1453–61. In 1443 Bonville was retained to serve King Henry VI for a one-year term and in 1449 was retained to serve the King at sea. He was summoned to Parliament from 10 March 1449 to 30 July 1460 by writs directed, for the most part, Willelmo Bonville domino Bonville et de Chuton ("To William Bonville, lord of Bonville and Chewton"), by which he is held to have become Baron Bonville. On 8 February 1461 he was nominated to the Order of the Garter.

In 1441 riots resulted from a dispute over the Duchy of Cornwall between Bonville and Thomas Courtenay, 13th Earl of Devon, and on 14 December 1455 the two sides fought the Battle of Clyst Heath near Exeter, which resulted in the defeat of Bonville, the sacking of Shute and injury to a number of persons.

According to Richardson, Bonville was to all outward appearances loyal to King Henry VI during the Wars of the Roses until he joined the Yorkist side at the Battle of Northampton in July 1460. Both his son, William Bonville, and his grandson, William Bonville, 6th Baron Harington, were slain at the Battle of Wakefield on 31 December 14.

Margaret of Anjou, who ordered the execution of William Bonville following the Second Battle of St Albans Less than two months later in February 1461 the Yorkists suffered another defeat at the Second Battle of St Albans, where Lord Bonville and another Yorkist, Sir Thomas Kyriel, were taken prisoner by the victorious Lancastrians. The two men had kept guard over King Henry VI during the battle to see that he came to no harm. The King had been held in captivity by Richard Neville, 16th Earl of Warwick, and transported in the train of the latter's army, but had been abandoned on the battlefield. In return for their gallantry the King promised the two men immunity. However Queen Margaret, who was present at the battle, remembered that Lord Bonville had been one of the men who had held King Henry in custody after the Battle of Northampton in July 1460, and wanted revenge. Disregarding the King's promise of immunity, she gave orders for the beheading of Lord Bonville and Sir Thomas Kyriel the next day, 18 February 1461. It is alleged that she put the men on trial and appointed as presiding judge her seven-year-old son, Prince Edward. "Fair son", Margaret is said to have inquired, "what death shall these knights die?" The young prince replied that they were to have their heads cut off, an act which was swiftly carried out, despite the King's pleas for mercy.

The inquisition for his proof of age was taken at Newcastle on 6 June 1418 and on 10 February 1419, the escheator in Northumberland was ordered to take the fealty of William Heron, son and heir of John Heron, and to give him seisin of his father's land.

William Heron married before 1418, Isabel, whose parentage is unknown.

On 1 September 1425, Sir William Heron of Ford, the second cousin of William Heron of Thornton, died leaving as his heir a daughter Elizabeth, aged three and no male heirs. In 1337, Sir William Heron of Ford had entailed Ford on his male heirs. William Heron of Thornton was Sir William's closest male relative and thus inherited the manor and castle of Ford. Between late 1425 and his death in early 1428, he became known as William Heron of Ford, a source of confusion in many histories of the family. He was however, never knighted.

William Heron of Ford was killed in a skirmish between his men and those of his neighbor Sir John Manners of Etal on 20 January 1428 when he was aged 30.

The inquisition post mortem for William Heron of Ford, for the lands which he held of the Bishop of Durham, was held at Norham on 22 January 1428, which found that his heir was John his son, aged 13. On 8 February 1428, the king commissioned Robert Umfraville, knight, William Tempest, knight, William Elmeden, knight, William Lampton, esquire, Emery Heryng and Robert Lampton, and to any two or more of them., including either Heryng or Robert Lampton, to enquire by sworn inquest of the county of Northumberland, as to the malefactors who lately slew William Heron, esquire, and Robert Atkynson his servant, and into the circumstances of the deed.

The inquisition post mortem of William Heron, esquire for the lands which he held in chief of the king was taken at Alnwick on 18 June 1428 which found that he died on 20 January 1428 and that his heir was John, his son, "aged 10 and no more." He held the castle and two-thirds of the manor of Ford as well as other lands in Northumberland including, two thirds of 1/4 manor of Whittingham with the hamlets of Barton and Thrunton. Presumably the other third of Ford was held in dower by Isabel, the widow of Sir William Heron and the other third of Whittingham was held in dower by Katherine, William Heron esquire's mother.

Percy was on the regency council in the early years of the new reign. Percy was later involved in the Wars of the Roses which placed him in an awkward situation. He owed his loyalty to the House of Lancaster but was first cousin of Anne Mortimer and kinsman to her son Richard Plantagenet, 3rd Duke of York, head of the House of York. On 22 May, 1455, Percy fought on the Lancastrian side in the First Battle of St Albans, first battle of the Wars. He was among the casualties. He died at age 63.
