**Sir William de Plumpton** (Sir Robert II<sup>24</sup>, Robert<sup>25</sup>, Nigel<sup>26</sup>, Robert<sup>27</sup>, Nigel<sup>28</sup>, Peter<sup>29</sup>, Elredus<sup>30</sup>, Nigel<sup>31</sup>, Petrus<sup>32</sup>, Nigelus<sup>33</sup>, Robert<sup>34</sup>) born c 1296 in Plumpton, Spofforth, West Riding died 1362 in Berwick-on-Tweed, Northumberland. Sir William de Plumpton was descended through his mother from William the Lion, King of Scotland. The Plumptons had since ancient times held most of their Yorkshire properties as tenants of the Percys, and in 1295, Sir Robert de Plumpton, Sir William's grandfather, adopted "the armorial insignia of his lord paramount, 'the Sire de Percy,'" slightly modified. William de Plumpton had been knighted by 19 September 1328 when he and his brother-in-law Sir Peter de Middleton witnessed a charter by Sir Henry Percy. Sir William de Plumpton served as a Member of Parliament representing Yorkshire in 1331. He was on many occasions called upon for his services in the North of England. On 10 February 1354 and again on 2 July 1354, Plumpton and others were appointed justices to enforce the Statute of Labourers in parts of Yorkshire. On 20 January 1347, an order of appointment by the king's council noted that "William de Plumpton who is of the retinue of Henry de Percy" was "about to go in his company to the march of Scotland for the defence thereof." The Percys, long an important family in Yorkshire and Lincolnshire, had become dominant landowners in Northumberland as the result of their 1309 purchase of Alnwick from the Bishop of Durham. King Edward III having made over to Henry Percy the reversionary interests in Warkworth and other Clavering estates on 2 March 1328, they passed to the Percy family in 1332 upon the death of John de Clavering. Sir William de Plumpton was no doubt a member of Henry Percy's retinue because Plumpton owed knight's service to Percy (1301-1352), his feudal lord. Percy must have called upon Plumpton for services in his retinue with some frequency. Percy took "part in the siege of Berwick, of which he was made the keeper, and fought at Halidon Hill." This is the battle in which Richard de Emeldon was killed. Plumpton and Lord Mowbray served together at least four times on commissions of oyer and terminer. First, Mowbray and Plumpton served on a commission convened

on 8 February 1350 to hear a complaint by Christopher Maillore that several miscreants had "broke his close and houses" at Hoton Conyers, Yorkshire, and done other damage. On 6 July 1352, Lord Mowbray and two others were added to a commission of which Plumpton was a member and which looked into a claim that a ship had been broken up and its timbers carried away. On 10 July 1356, Plumpton, Lord Mowbray, and three others were members of a commission that heard a complaint that an abbot, his fellow monks, and others had besieged a house near Knaresborough in Yorkshire and carried away goods. Last, on 26 June 1361, Lord Mowbray and Plumpton served together on a commission that heard a complaint by the Abbot of Fountains that disturbers of the peace had entered his free chaces and free warrens, felled trees, and carried away game from several places in Yorkshire.

**Sir Richard Tempest** (Sir Roger<sup>24</sup>, Sir Richard IV<sup>25</sup>, Sir Roger III<sup>26</sup>, Sir Richard<sup>27</sup>, Sir Roger<sup>28</sup>, Sir Archil<sup>29</sup>, Sir Ulchil<sup>30</sup>, Sir Anchil de Tempest<sup>31</sup>) born 1263 in Bracewell, West Riding, England died September 29, 1297 in Bracewell. The Parish of Bracewell, with the adjoining hamlet of Stoke, was a part of the great fee of Roger of Poitou, who came with William I, in 1066, remaining in his hand at the time of the Domesday Survey. The two great Saxon lords, Ulchil and Archil, had had to give us these lordships to this powerful Norman invader; and it was probably not long after the date of the Domesday Survey that these manors were granted to Roger de Tempest. That this man was a Norman, the name will not permit us to doubt; that he was a dependent of Roger of Poitou is extremely probable; that he was, at all events, possessed of these manors in the reign of Henry I is absolutely certain. The name Tempest, whatever its origin, seems to have been venerated by the family; as in the two next centuries, when local appellations became almost universal, they never chose to part with it. It is also alluded to in their armorial bearing.

**Henry FitzHenry** (Sir Hugh<sup>24</sup>, Sir Henry FitzRandolf<sup>25</sup>, Randolph FitzHugh<sup>26</sup>, Henry FitzHervey<sup>27</sup>, Hervey FitzAkarius<sup>28</sup>) born c 1266 in Ravensworth, North Yorkshire died May 6 1356 in Ravensworth. SIR HENRY FITZHUGH, of Ravensworth, was an adherent of Thomas, Earl of Lancaster. Thomas was the grandson of King Henry III. After the accession to the throne of England by his cousin, King Edward II, in 1307, Thomas became a leader of the barons in their resistance to the new king. Later, he submitted and received a pardon from the king in October 1313. He then took command of forces raised to fight the Scots. Along with Thomas, Sir Henry was also pardoned and joined the fight against the Scots. On May 20, 1315, Henry was granted 400 marks in recompense for the expenses he had incurred when on the King's service in Scotland. He was Constable of Barnard Castle from December 15, 1315, to September 27, 1319. On August 20, 1321, as a follower of Baron John de Moubray, Henry was involved in a rebellion against Hugh Despenser the Younger, who held lordship of Glamorgan and desired John's land in Gower. King Edward II banished the Despensers and granted pardons to John and Henry, amongst other barons who took part in the uprising. Henry was summoned for military service from January 1299/1300 to March 27, 1335; to Councils from May 1324 to February 25, 1341/1342; and to Parliament from May 15, 1321, to November 15, 1351. At this time, he became "Lord Fitzhugh." In May 1322 the Earl of Richmond accused Henry of having, with many followers -- -when the Earl was absent at the Parliament held in July 1321 --- besieged and taken the Earl's castle of Bowes, and having held it for a long time, doing great damage, finally leaving it without guard against the Scots. On February 1, 1322/1323 Henry was ordered to arrest Andrew de Harcla, Earl of Carlisle, who had lately joined the Scots (or was considered to have joined them). He also was appointed a justice, in Northumberland, Cumberland, and Westmorland, to hear and determine the oppressions committed by the King's ministers and others, December 10, 1340. Lord Henry Fitzhugh was engaged in the Scottish wars from the 3rd to the 8th years of the reign of King Edward II [1310-1315]. During the next six years he was constituted, owing to the minority of the Earl of Warwick (whose inheritance it was), to be governor of Barnard Castle in the bishopric of Durham. Being again employed in Scotland, he was summoned to parliament as a baron from May 15, 1321, to November 15, 1351. In 1327, his lordship (Fitzhugh) acquitted Sir Henry Vavasour, a Knight, of a debt of 500 marks, by special instrument under his seal, upon condition that Sir Henry's son, also named Henry Vavasour, should take as his wife Annabil Fitzhugh, Henry Fitzhugh's daughter. In the 7th, 8th, and 9th years of King Edward III's reign [1334, 1335, and 1336], Lord Fitzhugh was again in arms upon the Scottish soil. His lordship married his first wife, Eve, daughter of Sir John Bulmer, a Knight. With Eve, Lord Fitzhugh had, besides the daughter already mentioned, a son named Henry, who died "in vita Patris" (died before his father), leaving children by his wife, Joane, the daughter of Sir Richard Fournes and the sister and heiress of William Fournes - (1) a son, Hugh, who married Isabel (the daughter of Ralph, Lord Nevill) and died "sine parole" (without children); and (2) Henry, who survived his grandfather.

**Sir Geoffrey le Scrope** (Sir William Bracewell<sup>24</sup>, Sir William<sup>25</sup>, Henry<sup>26</sup>, Simon<sup>27</sup>, Robert<sup>28</sup>, Hugh<sup>29</sup>, Walter<sup>30</sup>,\_) Chief Justice of Masham, born c 1277 in Masham, Yorkshire died December 3, 1340 in Coverham Abbey, Yorkshire. English lawyer, and Chief Justice of the King's Bench for four periods between 1324 and 1338. He was the son of Sir William le Scrope, who was bailiff to the earl of Richmond in Richmondshire. Geoffrey's older brother Henry was also a lawyer, and served as Chief Justice twice, 1317 – 23 and 1329 – 30. In the baronial conflicts of the reign of Edward II he was a loyal adherent of the crown. He was involved in the proceedings both against Thomas of Lancaster and Andrew Harclay. He was knighted in 1323, and became Chief Justice for the first time the next year. He managed, however, to survive politically the overthrow both of Edward II in 1326 and of Roger Mortimer in 1330. After retiring as a justice, he campaigned with Edward III in Flanders, and distinguished himself as a soldier. He was also one of the instigators behind the king's actions against Archbishop Stratford in 1340. He died at Ghent the same year, probably on December 2, and was buried at Coverham Abbey, Yorkshire. Geoffrey and his wife Ivetta had five sons. Their eldest son, Henry, became the first Baron Scrope of Masham.

**Sir John de Grey, Sr.** (Sir Robert<sup>24</sup>, Sir Walter<sup>25</sup>, Sir Robert<sup>26</sup>) 1<sup>st</sup> Baron of Rotherfield born c 1271 in Rotherfield, Oxfordshire died October 17, 1311 in Rotherfield Greys. summoned to Parliament as first Baron Grey of Rotherfield on 26th January 1297. He took part in the Scottish wars under Longshanks and fought in the glorious victory at Falkirk in 1298 against William Wallace, when a large part of Edward's troops refused to fight. He was back in Scotland again in 1306 after the rebellion and enthronement of Robert Bruce. He died in 1312 having married Margaret, daughter of William de Odingsells of Maxstoke, Warwickshire and was succeeded by his son, John de

Grey, second Baron Grey of Rotherfield (1300-1359). John de Grey was probably the most famous of the de Greys of Rotherfield.

John was among the Adherants of Thomas Earl of Lancaster, who were responsible for the beheading, without trial, of king Edward 2nd's friend Peter (Piers) Gaveston in 1312., for which he was pardoned Oct 1312. He was summoned, as John Marmion "le fitz" for military service against the Scots in 1314, and again in 1322 and 1323. In Aug 1322 he had letters of protection for going to Scotland with the Earl of Richmond, and in Oct of that year, he was appointed commissioner of array for North Riding. He was summoned to Parliament 3 Dec 1326, and in Sep 1327 was named on a commission of oyer and terminer for Yorkshire. In that same year, he and wife Maud made a settlement in special tail male of the manors of Tanfield and Carthorpe. In May 1329 he had a protection for three years for going on pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

**Sir Warin de L'Isle** (Gerard<sup>24</sup>, Rober<sup>25</sup>, Robert de Insula, III<sup>26</sup>, Robert, II<sup>27</sup>, Robert, I<sup>28</sup>) Keeper of Windsor Castle born c 1271 in Kingston-Lisle, Berkshire died March 16, 1322 in Yorkshire. English nobleman and soldier during King Edward III's campaigns in Scotland and France. He resided chiefly at Stowe Nine Churches in Northamptonshire and Kingston Lisle (in Sparsholt),

Berkshire (now Oxfordshire). He was knighted in 1327. In 1329 he proved his right to free warren in his demesne lands at Stowe and Kissingbury, Northamptonshire by grant of King Henry III to Geoffrey de Armenters. In 1332 Richard Herman was attached to answer Gerard de Lisle concerning a plea why with force and arms he broke the close of the said Gerard at Alverston, Hampshire and dug in his separate soil there, and took and carried away twenty cartloads of earth extracted therefrom to the value of 40 shillings, and depastured, trampled on, and consumed his grass once growing there to the value of 60 shillings. In 1339 Gerard had a dispute with his mother, Alice, regarding the presentation of the church of Stowe, Northamptonshire, but admitted it was not his turn to present; he also complained of trespass on his park at Stowe. He served on the English side in the Second War of Scottish Independence in 1333 and 1335, under Richard FitzAlan, 10th Earl of Arundel. He served with him again during the Hundred Years' War in France and fought at the Battle of Crecy, 1346. He was summoned to Parliament on 15 December 1357, by writs directed to Gerardo de Insula or de L'Isle, whereby he is held to have become Baron Lisle. He was summoned to a Council 20 June 1358.

Oliver was jailed at Winchester for his involvement in the civil wars of Edward II of England, but was released in 1324 to serve under Edmund of Woodstock, 1st Earl of Kent in the Duchy of Aquitaine during the short War of Saint-Sardos against France. In 1326 Oliver was appointed Seneschal of Gascony, the highest post in what remained in English possession. He managed to raise an army of mercenaries and capture a number of strongholds in Agenais and Saintonge. However the political climate at home had changed. Edward II had been deposed and replaced by his son Edward III under the regency of Queen Isabella and Roger Mortimer. The regents wanted peace and in the final treaty the loss of Agenais was accepted and Ingham's conquests abandoned. To appease the French Oliver was at first recalled to England, but was reappointed Seneschal of Gascony in

June 1331. He still held this office in 1337 when the Hundred Years War broke out and he was tasked with defending Gascony from French invasion. The defenses of the duchy had been undermined with the loss of several key castles in the previous war and the loyalty of the local nobility was divided as many owned estates on both sides of the border. English strategy in the early years centered on invading Northern France; Oliver received neither troops nor funds from England, but had to rely entirely on local resources. The income of the duchy depended mainly on tolls and customs on the river trade, this dried up almost entirely with the onset of war. Most of what revenue remained had to be expended on paying garrison commanders. As a result Oliver's government at Bordeaux had very limited options in how to conduct the defense.

Baron de Mowbray sided with Thomas, 2nd Earl of Lancaster at the Battle of Boroughbridge against King Edward II. After Lancaster was defeated Mowbray was executed and his wife and son John were imprisoned in the Tower of London until the king was deposed by Queen Isabella and Roger Mortimer. The Mowbrays were released in 1327. De Mowbray, was released from the Tower, and his father's lands were restored to him, on the deposition of Edward II in January 1327. Though still under age he was allowed livery of his lands, but his marriage was granted, for services to Queen Isabella, to Henry, earl, of Lancaster, who married him to his fifth daughter, Joan. His mother's great estates in Gower, Sussex, &c., came to him on her death in 1331. Henceforth he styled himself 'Lord of the Isle of Axholme and of the Honours of Gower and Bramber.' The De Brewers inheritance involved him in a protracted litigation with his mother's cousin, Thomas de Brewes which had begun as early as 1338, and was still proceeding in 1347. Mowbray had also had a dispute before his mother's death with her second husband, Sir Richard Peshall, touching certain manors in

Bedfordshire, &c., which he and his mother had granted to him for life, and in 1329 forcibly entered them.

Mowbray was regularly summoned to the parliaments and 'colloquia' from 1328 to 1361, and was a member of the king's council from the former year. In 1327, 1333, 1335, and again in 1337, he served against the Scots; but there is little evidence for Dugdale's statement that he frequently served in France. In 1337, when war with France was impending he was ordered as lord of Gower to arm his tenants; next year he had to provide ships for the king's passage to the continent, and was sent down to his Sussex estates in the prospect of a French landing. According to Froissart, he was with the king in Flanders in October 1339, but this is impossible, for he was present at the parliament held in that month, and was ordered to repair towards his Yorkshire estates to defend the Scottish marches. Next year he was appointed justiciar of Lothian and governor of Berwick, towards whose garrison he was to provide 120 men, including ten knights. In September 1341 he was commanded to furnish Balliol with men from Yorkshire. On 20 Dec. 1342 he received orders to hold himself ready to go to the assistance of the king in Brittany by 1 March 1348, and Froissart makes him take part in the siege of Nantes; but the truce of Malestroit was concluded on 19 Jan., and on 6 Feb. the reinforcements were countermanded.

At Neville's Cross (17 Oct. 1346) Mowbray fought in the third line, and the Lanercost chronicler loudly sings his praises: 'He was full of grace and kindness -- the conduct both of himself and his men was such as to redound to their perpetual honour'. Froissart, nevertheless, again takes him to France, with the king. In 1347 he was again in the Scottish marches. On the expiration, in 1352, of one of the short truces which began in 1347, he was appointed chief of the commissioners charged with the defense of the Yorkshire coast against the French, and required to furnish thirty men from Gower. The king sent him once more to the Scottish border in 1355. In December 1359 he was made a justice of the peace in the district of Holland, Lincolnshire, and in the following February a commissioner of array at Leicester for Lancashire, Nottinghamshire, Leicestershire, Derbyshire, and Rutland. This, taken with the fact that he was summoned on 3 April 1360 to the parliament fixed for 15 May, makes it excessively improbable that he was skirmishing before Paris in April as stated by Froissart. It is possible, however, that the Sire de Montbrai mentioned by Froissart was Mowbray's son and heir, John.

Mowbray died at York of the plague on 4 Oct. 1361, and was buried in the Franciscan church at Bedford. The favourable testimony which the Lanercost chronicler bears to the character of John de Mowbray is borne out by a piece of documentary evidence. In order to put an end to disputes between his steward and his tenants in Axholme, he executed a deed on 1 May 1359 reserving a certain part of the extensive wastes in the isle to himself, and granting the remainder in perpetuum to the tenants. This deed was jealously preserved as the palladium of the commoners of Axholme in Haxey Church 'in a chest bound with iron, whose key was kept by some of the chiefest freeholders, under a window wherein was a portraiture of Mowbray, set in ancient stained glass, holding in his hand a writing, commonly reported to be an emblem of the deed'. This window was broken down in the 'rebellious times,' when the rights of the commoners under the deed were in large

measure overridden, in spite of their protests, by the drainage scheme which was begun by Cornelius Vermuyden in 1626 and led to riots in 1642, and again in 1697.

Summoned for service in Gascony in December of 1324. He was appointed, by Prince Edward's government, Sheriff of Yorkshire (Nov 1326) and was a member of the Council of Regency in February 1326/27. In November 1327, he

served as a commissioner to negotiate with the Scots for peace, as well as a similar role with France in February 1329/30. In 1334, he entertained the King at Helmsley, and during the King's absence in Flanders, he was one of the commissioners to preserve the peace in that country. **Earl Ralph de Stafford** (Edmund<sup>24</sup>, Sir Nicholas<sup>25</sup>, Robert<sup>26</sup>, Sir Herve<sup>27</sup>, Herve FitzBagot<sup>28</sup>, Bagot of Bramshall<sup>30</sup>) 1<sup>st</sup> Earl of Stafford born September 24, 1300 in Amington, Staffordshire died August 31, 1372 in Tonbridge, Kent. Stafford was made a Knight banneret in 1327 and was fighting the Scots shortly afterwards. He supported the plot to free Edward III of England from the control of Roger Mortimer, which earned the king's gratitude. By the summer of 1332, he was a commissioner of the peace in Staffordshire and had served abroad on royal business, accompanying Hugh de Audley, 1st Earl of Gloucester. He was also still fighting the Scots, commanding archers at the Battle of Dupplin Moor on 11 Aug 1332 and on three further Scottish campaigns. He was first summoned to Parliament by writ as Lord Stafford on 29 November 1336 and continued to attend until 1350. His military career continued, accompanying King Edward to France in 1338 as an advisor and being present at the naval battle of Sluys on 24 June 1340. He also fought at the relief of Brest and the siege of Morlaix. He was captured at Vannes but was exchanged in time to negotiate a truce at Malestroit. On 6 January 1341, he was made Steward of the Royal Household but resigned that post on 29 March 1345 having assumed the office of Seneschal of Aquitaine, an English possession in France, where he stayed for about a year. Further battles included the battle of Auberoche, the siege of Aiguillon, from where he escaped prior to its lifting, a raid on Barfleur and the English victory at the Battle of Crecy, on 26 August 1346. He became one of the twenty-six founding members and the fifth Knight of the Order of the Garter in 1348. In November 1347, his wife's father died; they were able to take possession of his estates without paying the king's homage, an indication of the relationship between them. Ralph was now a very wealthy man, from his estates and from the many prizes from the French war. Edward III created a number of new peerage titles to honor his war captains and to mark his jubilee year. Ralph was created the 1st Earl of Stafford on 5 March 1350, with an annuity of 1000 marks. He now replaced Henry of Grosmont, 1st Duke of Lancaster as the king's lieutenant in Gascony, he committed to serve with 200 men at his expense with the

expectation of this being doubled in March 1353 at the king's expense. The campaigns provided several captives that were ransomed, but were ultimately unsuccessful, leading to the appointment of Edward, Prince of Wales to command. Even at the age of sixty, Stafford continued to command troops and act as a royal envoy, both in France and in Ireland in 1361, accompanying Lionel of Antwerp to try and restore English control.

From 1336 he is frequently mentioned as engaged in some public service, especially in preserving the peace and public safety in the troublous Border district where he lived. In November 1337 he and his wife Isabel made a settlement of the manor of Ford and the advowson of the church, the remainders being to his sons Roger, William, John and Thomas. On 16 July 1338 he had license to crenellate his manor house of Ford, and in April 1340, for good services rendered as King's yeoman in Scotland and elsewhere, he had license to hold his fortified house by the name of castle, and to have free warren in his demesne lands. In 1341 payment was ordered to him of £48 as wages for himself and his men-at-arms and hobelers who were employed on the King's service in the March of Scotland, and in 1344 he had a grant of the custody of Trollop. He fought in the battle of Nevill's Cross, near Durham, in 1346, and received a grant of forfeited lands, including a confirmation of the manor of Thornton in Norham, which he had purchased, and was made a knight in or before 1348. In 1346 John Darcy the son, lord of Knayth, claimed the manor of Ford against William Heron and Isabel his wife, alleging a settlement made by Sir William Heron (grandfather of William), but on 2 March 1347/8 he formally renounced all right in the lands. William Heron was appointed Keeper of Berwick-on-Tweed in 1350, and next year, as chivaler, with Isabel his wife, Roger his brother, and Roger, John, Walter. Thomas, Robert and Andrew, his sons, was called upon to acknowledge the various services by which the lands in Ford and in other places were held by them of John de Coupland, chivaler, of Wooler. In 1353 he was serving in Scotland with ten men-at-arms and twenty archers. He acquired the Tailbois manor of Croydon, in co. Cambridge, about 1354, a tenement at North Gosford in 1361/2, and the manor of Whittingham,

near Alnwick, jointly with Sir John Heron in 1371. He appears to have been charged with complicity in the murder of John de Coupland on Bolton Moor, near Alnwick, in December 1363 being next year a prisoner at Winchester, but was able to rebut the charge, for in September 1366 he and his son, Sir Roger, gave a release of all actions to Joan, the widow of John de Coupland, and others who, had sued the evildoers who had killed her husband. He was summoned to Parliament, 8 January 1370/1, by writ directed Willelmo Heron, whereby he is he ld to have become LORD HERON. He was not summoned again, nor were any of his descendants. At Easter 1373 he and his sons Roger and Thomas were called upon to show by what services they held Ford and other lands of Joan, widow of John de Coupland.

He was commissioned to arrange the terms upon which David of Scotland, who had been taken prisoner at Neville's Cross, should be allowed to return to his dominions, and in 1354 he signed the treaty which set the Scottish King at liberty. In 1356 he took part in Edward III's invasion of Scotland. That monarch after burning several towns, including Edinburgh, and laying waste all the country which he traversed, was compelled for want of provisions to beat a retreat which had disastrous consequences. The Scots, inflamed with the desire to avenge their miseries, followed the retiring army and in their turn devastated Northumberland. Edward's raid into Scotland became famous as the 'Burnt Candlemas'. For several years after this the Earl was continuously employed in warfare either on the Borders or in France.

**Duke Lionel Plantagenet** (King Edward III<sup>24</sup>, King Edward II<sup>25</sup>, King Edward I "Longshanks"<sup>26</sup>\_) was born in Antwerp, Brabant November 29, 1338. Lionel of Antwerp, Duke of Clarence was the third son, but the second son to survive infancy, of Edward III of England and Philippa of Hainault. He was so called because he was born at Antwerp. Betrothed when a child to Elizabeth de Burgh, 4th Countess of Ulster, daughter and heiress of William Donn de Burgh, 3rd Earl of Ulster (d. 1332), he was married to her in 1352, but before this date he had entered into possession of her great Irish inheritance.

Having been named as his father's representative in England in 1345 and again in 1346, Lionel joined an expedition into France in 1355, but his chief energies were reserved for the affairs of Ireland. He was called Earl of Ulster from 1347. Appointed governor of that country, he landed at Dublin in 1361, and in November of the following year was created Duke of Clarence, while his father made an abortive attempt to secure for him the crown of Scotland. His efforts to secure an effective authority over his Irish lands were only moderately successful; and after holding a parliament at Kilkenny, which passed the celebrated Statute of Kilkenny in 1367, he dropped the task in disgust and returned to England..

Lionel's wife died in Dublin in 1363, leaving behind a daughter, Philippa, whose descendants would one day claim the throne for the House of York. A second marriage

was arranged for Lionel with Violante (c. 1353 - November 1386), daughter of Galeazzo Visconti, lord of Pavia (d. 1378); the enormous dowry which Galeazzo promised with his daughter being exaggerated by the rumor of the time. Journeying to fetch his bride, Lionel was received in great state both in France and Italy, and was married to Violante at Milan on 28 May 1368. Some months were then spent in festivities, during which Lionel was taken ill at Alba, where he died. There was strong speculation at the time that he had been poisoned by his father-in-law although this has never been proven. Lionel died October 17, 1368 in Alba, Piedmont, Italy, at 29 years of age. His body was interred Clare Priory, Suffolk. His only child, Philippa Plantagenet, married in 1368 Edmund Mortimer, 3rd Earl of March (1351-1381). Their granddaughter and eventual heir, Anne Mortimer, married into the Yorkist branch of the English Royal family. The House of York based its claim to the throne on this line of descent.

**Maurice Berkeley** (Thomas<sup>24</sup>, Maurice<sup>25</sup>, Thomas<sup>26</sup>,\_) 2<sup>nd</sup> Baron Berkeley born April 1271 in Bristol, Gloucestershire died May 31, 1326 in Wallingford Castle, Berkshire. He was involved in the Scottish Wars from about 1295 to 1318. He acceded on 16 August 1308, was Governor of Gloucester 1312, Governor of Berwick-on-Tweed from 1314 which he lost to the Scots under the 1317 Capture of Berwick, Steward of the Duchy of Aquitaine 1319 and Justiciar of South Wales 1316. With the Earl of Lancaster, he rebelled against King Edward II, for which he was imprisoned in Wallingford Castle in Berkshire (now Oxfordshire), where he died on 31 May 1326 and was eventually buried at St Augustine's Abbey in Bristol.
