John (Johannes) Heinemann (Johann Jost^e, Johann Henrich[?]) was born in Iringshausen, near Kassel, Germany November 9, 1833 to Johann Jost Heineman and Anna Catharina Peter. He was baptized in Lutheran Church, Ihringshausen, Germany, November 17, 1833. He immigrated to the United States in 1849/1851, destination: Keokuk, Iowa where there was a strong German community. Johannes was a tailor by profession upon his arrival.

He married **Sophia Elisabeth Paul** in Keokuk, Iowa, April 29, 1859.

Sophia Elisabeth Paul (Heinrich^e), daughter of Heinrich Paul and Justine Wasmuth, was born in Ovenhausen, Hoxter, Rhine Province, Germany November 9, 1829. She was baptized 9 Nov 1829. She immigrated, aboard the SS Bremerhaven to New Orleans, to the United States, June/July 1857.

John (Johannes) Heineman died July 30, 1906 in Keokuk, IA - Lee County, at 72 years of age. He is buried in Lot A, Oakland Cemetery, Keokuk.



he wished to, with a smile on his lips, his last words being of comfort to his family who for the past two weeks have known that the death angel was hovering over the one they loved so well.

John Heineman was one of the original charter members of the German Evangelical church when it was founded in Keokuk forty-eight years ago. One by one the pioneers who signed the charter have passed away and in the death of Mr. Heineman the church loses the last one of the charter members of nearly a half century.

Mr. Heineman had been ill for some weeks past from an affection of the liver which was the beginning of the end. He knew that his days were numbered, but never did he bemoan the fact that he must soon cross the river, he being prepared to die.

He was born in Eringhaus, near Castle, Germany, November 19, 1832 and while he was still a small boy his parents passed away. Left an orphan, he struggled on as best he could until he reached the seventeenth milestone, when he determined to come to America, where he landed in 1849. In 1857 he reached Keokuk, Iowa, and engaged in his work as a journeyman tailor, he being recognized as a workman of sterling worth. That same year he was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Paul, who still survives him, as well as the following children: Mrs. George J. Schell, Mrs. Emil Kapp and Mrs. H. C. Bode, of Keokuk; John Heineman of Keokuk, and Henry W. Heineman of Columbus, Neb.

He was one of the representative German citizens of the city in which he has been an honored resident for nearly a half century. He was of a quiet, home-loving disposition, a great lover of nature and was never so happy as when with his family or when taking one of the long walks he enjoyed so much. As a churchman he was loved by the entire German Evangelical congregation, as well as by the entire community.

Sophia Elisabeth Paul died November 13, 1906 in Keokuk, IA - Lee County, at 77 years of age. She is buried in Lot A, Oakland Cemetery, Keokuk.

She Sinks into the Sleep of Death, Following the Husband She Mourned to the Land Beyond the Grave

AN ESTIMABLE WOMAN

Grief Over Death of Husband and Old Age Troubles, Responsible for her Death - Funeral Thursday

Continual brooding over the death four months ago to the land beyond the grave, brought on a complication of ailments which resulted in the death yesterday of Mrs. John Heineman, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. George Schell, 726 Morgan street. Mrs. Heineman for some years past has been in poor health and when her companion for many years gave up the battle of life a short time ago, she was obliged to take to her bed. After that she continued to get weaker and weaker, sinking into a peaceful sleep, with a smile on her lips, when the death angel summoned her. Miss Elizabeth Paul was born in Hexter, Rhine province, Germany on November 9, 1829, last Friday being her seventy-seventh birthday anniversary. She came of a noble German family well known throughout the province. On July 29, 1857, she came to this country and two years later, April 29, 1859 married in Keokuk to John Heineman. Since that time Keokuk has been her home.

Since the death of John Heineman, her husband, last July, Mrs. Heineman has lived quietly at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Schell, where her friends of St. Mary's Catholic Church, of which she was a devout member, paid her many visits in an endeavor to cheer her up and to comfort her bereavement. Her room always contained a profusion of flowers of which she was a great lover, although she frequently expressed the wish that after she was gone loving friends would refrain from sending floral tokens.

Mrs. Heineman was a devout Christian woman in every sense of the word, and even in the hours of her greatest sorrow, she always had a word of comfort for those who like herself, were bowed down with grief.

She is survived by the following children: Mrs. George Schell, Mrs. Emile Kapp, Mrs. H. C. Bode, John W. Heineman of this city, and Henry W. Heineman of Columbus, Neb. One brother is living, Edward Paul of Quincy.

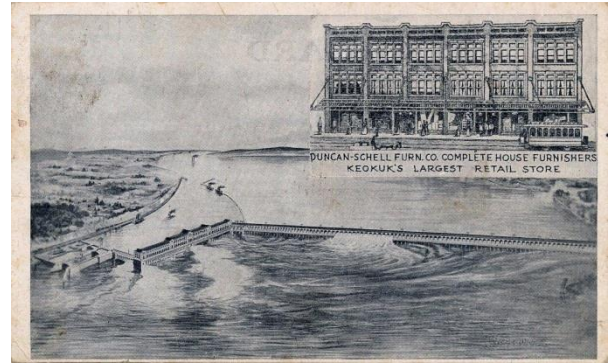
The funeral will be held Thursday morning from St. Mary's Catholic church, at 9:30 o'clock friends being invited. The burial will be private.

MRS. SCHELL'S DEATH OCCURS ON SATURDAY
Life Long Resident of Keokuk Dies at Her Home 726 Morgan Street Very Suddenly Saturday Morning at 9 O'Clock.

Mrs. Elizabeth Schell a lifelong and prominent resident of Keokuk died very suddenly at her home 726 Morgan street Saturday morning at 9 o'clock. Her death coming as it did with even the members of her family unaware of the seriousness of her condition, was a great shock to her many friends and the entire community. She had been ill for more than a year but was not confined to her bed.

Mrs. Schell was of a deeply religious nature and devoted to her church, working actively for its welfare as long as her health permitted. She had a great capacity for friendship and will be profoundly missed by her many close friends and acquaintances.

The daughter of John and Elizabeth Paul Heineman, she was born in Keokuk and has spent all of her life in this city where she attended and graduated from the public schools.

On May (?), 19(?) she was united in marriage with John George Schell (December 15, 1860-November 10, 1932) who survives her. Two children were born of this union.

She was a member of St. Paul's Evangelical church and of the Ladies Aid society and Seminary club.

Surviving her besides her husband are two children, Edward Schell of Washington, D.C., and Mrs. R.D. Dewey of Keokuk. There are also two brothers, John Heineman of Keokuk, and Henry Heineman of Columbus, Nebraska and a grandson, Edward Dewey, in addition to a number of nieces and nephews.

EMIL H. KAPP IS STRICKEN EARLY TODAY
Life-long Resident of Keokuk Suffers Cerebral Hemorrhage While Visiting Friends Yesterday – Dies This Morning

Emil H. Kapp died at shortly after midnight today at the St. Joseph's hospital from an attack of cerebral hemorrhage. He was stricken suddenly last evening while visiting at the home of George Schell and was immediately removed to the hospital.

He was born in Keokuk, on July 3, 1857, and spent practically all of his life in this city. At the time of his death he was seventy one years, four months and twenty-seven days old.

On May 27, 1903, he was united in marriage to Miss Marie Heineman who survives him. One child was born to this union.

He was a life-long member of St. Paul's Evangelical church, and a member of the Baraca Sunday school class. He was also a member of the Modern Woodmen and Odd Fellows lodges.

Surviving him are his wife, one son, Hubert Kapp, at home; a sister, Mrs. Victor Miller, and on granddaughter, Miss Claudine Kapp, of Clinton. He had one son by a former marriage who preceded him in death three years ago.

The funeral services will be held from St. Paul's Evangelical church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The Modern Woodmen will hold their services for both Mr. Kapp and for Leroy Gaines this evening at 8 o'clock from the Keokuk Funeral Home.

Mrs. J. Fred Kiedaisch, S. Died Last Evening at the Family Resi.

HER LIFE SPENT HERE

Keokuk, the Birth Place of Estimable Woman Whose Passing Was Caused by Heart Ailment.

All Keokuk was extremely shocked today on receiving the sad intelligence of the death of Mrs. J. Fred Kiedaisch, Sr. Retiring in apparently good health at ten o'clock last evening, even the immediate members of the beloved woman's family did not realize that her passing was so near.

At eleven o'clock, an hour after going to her room, Mrs. Kiedaisch called for assistance and her daughter responding to the mother's aid, found her in a faint. A physician was immediately summoned but before arrival of medical aid, death had come. For three years, Mrs. Kiedaisch has been troubled with a heart affection and thought at times her condition was grave, lately, however, she had not intimated being seriously ill. Her retirement last evening in presumable good health and death shortly after comes as a shock of deepest sorrow to members of her family and hundreds of friends who were happy in the acquaintance of this well known woman, held in bright esteem and best of love by many.

All Her Life in Keokuk.

Mrs. Kiedaisch had always lived in this city. Mary Madeline Schowalter was born March 27, 1850, and had passed the sixtieth year of a life whose greatest joy was in the care of her family with whom she had been richly blessed. Attending the public schools of Keokuk she grew to young womanhood, the dutiful daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Schowalter, among Keokuk's earliest settlers, and former highly respected residents of this city.

Thirty-six years ago, the tenth day of this month, Mary Madeline Schowalter and J. Fred Kiedaisch were united in marriage. To the union eight children were born and seven now survive.

Her Christian Duties

From the time that the decedent was a young girl, she had ever been faithful in the performance of her Christian duties. Conscientious and with sweet faith, she worked willingly and with active zeal in the St. Paul's Evangelical church. For many years, Mrs. Kiedaisch was treasurer of the Ladies Aid society, auxiliary to that house of worship and was one of the organization's foremost workers. It is here, next to the place in her home which she filled as a saintly woman and Godly mother and wife, that her absence in future will be keenly felt.

Never seeking the worldly pleasures with which this life is surrounded in bounty, the first duty of the deceased woman, whose death is today mourned, was to her home. Loving dearly, children, those natural traits were of course uppermost in rearing to splendid young man and womanhood, the sons and daughters for whom her entire life was spent in making happy.

Pleasantly assisting her husband in the business duties of life, she portrayed those ideals in a wife that made her best fitted for the exalted position she held, in the home and in the eyes of all those who knew and

loved her with homage and respect.

The proportions of the largest combined drug establishments, as they stand today, centers in Keokuk's business life, are due in a large measure to the guiding mind and help of Mrs. Kiedaisch as she aided her husband in their direction with a firm and loving hand.

Those bereaved relatives who survive to mourn their loss in the death of this good woman, besides the husband, are her children: G. Arthur, Walter C., of Erie, Pa., J. Albert, Lyda F., Marie M., Karl, and Edward, and step-son, J. Heineman, Mrs. Henry Pechstein, John Schowalter and Albert Burger of this city. Several grandchildren are also among the relatives.

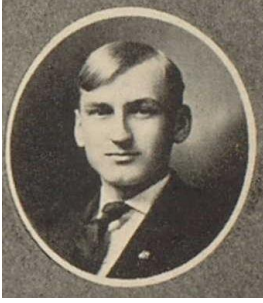

Henry Pechstein was born January 16, 1859, in Keokuk, a son of Conrad Pechstein. He has always made this city his home and succeeded his father in the brewery, with whose management he is connected at the present time as secretary, his brother, George C. Pechstein, being vice president and brewmaster. The business was incorporated in 1905, being capitalized for fifty thousand dollars. It is well managed and returns satisfactory dividends, but the quality of the product is not sacrificed to financial gain.

On the 25th of May, 1881, Mr. Pechstein married Miss Elizabeth F. Burger, a daughter of August Burger and Mrs. Johanna (Hopp) Schowalter. The Schowalters were among the earliest settlers in Lee County, arriving here in the early '30s. Mr. and Mrs. Lechstein became the parents of six children, as follows: Albert Magnus, who passed away in infancy; Paul T. ; John H.; Alberta; George C. ; and Conrad August.

Mr. Pechstein has been a lifelong democrat, casting his first Presidential vote for General Hancock, but has never cared for office. Since 1881 he has been identified with the Independent, Order of Odd Fellows and is also a member of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks, the Eagles and the Moose. Religiously he holds membership in the German Lutheran Evangelical church.

Elizabeth died June 3, 1932 in Keokuk, Iowa, at 73 years of age. She and Carl are buried in Oakland Cemetery, Keokuk.

They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last year. The marriage occurred at the bride's home and the Rev. Grams was the officiating pastor.

Surviving Mrs. Pechstein are her husband and five children, two grandchildren and two sisters and a brother. The children are Paul T. Pechstein, J. Henry Pechstein, Mrs. Alberta Pechstein Foster, and Conrad A. Pechstein, all of Keokuk, and George C. Pechstein of Sioux City. One sister, Mrs. Catherine Schwaner is living in Hollywood, Calif., and the brother and sister here are Albert F. Burger and Mrs. John Heinemann. The two grandchildren are Paul T. Pechstein Jr., and Henry August Pechstein. One son Albert Magnus, died in infancy.

Member of St. Paul's

Mrs. Pechstein was a member of the St. Paul's Evangelical church, and was prominent in the Ladies Aid Society of the church, which she served for some time as president, and in Seminary Club in which she was a most active member. She attended church

PROMINENT RESIDENT IS SUMMONED
Henry Pechstein, Co-Owner with the Late John Nagel of the Pechstein and Nagel Brewery, Dies at His Home Last Night.

At 11 o'clock last night occurred the death of Henry Pechstein former co-owner of the Pechstein and Nagel Brewery and one of the most prominent and highly esteemed residents of Keokuk. His death occurred at his home 1028 Concert street, and followed a stroke of paralysis suffered (?) Thursday.

On August 26 of this year he sustained a preliminary stroke but had apparently recovered and was enjoying good health until last week. His death was profoundly regretted by the entire community which regarded him as one of its finest and most representative citizens.

Devoted to Home

Mr. Pechstein was a kindly man and one who had a friendly word for all. There are many people in Keokuk who know hundreds of kindly deeds and acts which he performed but which were done without any ostentation or show. He loved his home and his entire life was devoted to it and to his family.

The death of his wife brought deep sorrow to him which not even his children, whom he loved dearly and to whom he was ever devoted, could lighten.

Walking was one of his greatest pleasures in later life as were his visits with friends and work about his house in his garden. Until stricken in August, he was unusually active for a man of his years, kept himself well informed and was a careful and analytical reader, always keeping abreast of the times.

Father Founded Brewery

All of his life has been spent in the brewing business. His father, the late Conrad Pechstein, founded the

Pechstein brewery in 1853 and then took in the late John Nagel as his partner. These men died within three months of each other and their wives operated the brewery in the interests of the two families until the two sons, Henry Pechstein and John Nagel were 16 and 18 years of age respectively.

At that time they took over the operation of the plant and continued it as a partnership until 1903 when they incorporated. It was operated as the Pechstein and Nagel Co. until disbanded on January 1, 1916, with the advent of prohibition. Both then retired and John Nagel died some none years ago. Family friendship was the keynote of the brewery's success through two generations and in death Mr. Pechstein will be at the side of his friend and partner, John Nagel.

One of State's Largest

This plant was one of the biggest breweries in Iowa and was located at a spot of historical importance in that the site of most of the building coincided with the beginnings of the famous old Plank road. The brewery builders were sold in 1923 to the school board and removed to make room for the new Senior High School building.

The Pechstein and Nagel families came into possession of the property which had been owned by P. Haubert by purchase in 1853. It was enlarged and entirely rebuilt in the early nineties and modernized in 190(?)

As a boy Mr. Pechstein learned the brewing business in the Schoenhofen Brewery in Chicago, Ill, and also with Dick Bros. in Quincy and with William J. Lemp in St. Louis. He was a graduate from the Whi-Hennies Brewing Institute in Chicago in 1891 as a master of the art of brewing.

Born in Keokuk

The son of Conrad and Katherine Kirchner Pechstein, he was born in Keokuk on January 18, 1859, and spent all of his life here.

On May 25, 1881, he was united in marriage with Elizabeth Frances Burger. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on May 25, 1931. Mrs Pechstein died on June 3, 1932. ___ children born to them, one of whom died in infancy.

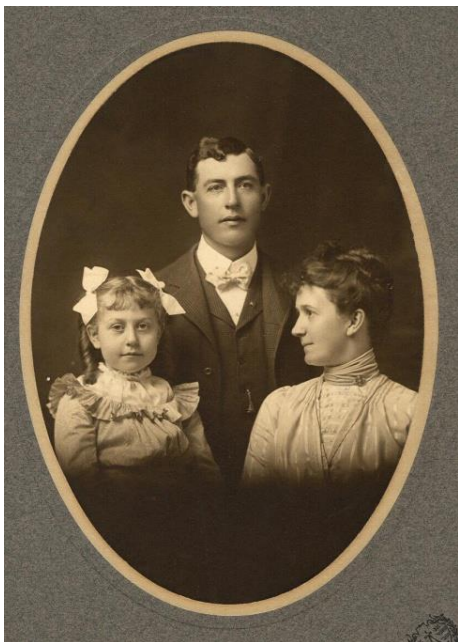

Munke Bjergby Kirke Today

Munke Bjergb Kirke was built around 1140. The church consists of Romanesque north chapel, porch, tower and sacristy. The Romanesque part is constructed with small, rough and chopped ground stone and chopped granite blocks. In addition, the stone from Steven's cliff is used for decorative purposes on the outside of apsis (two chalkstones pilasters and two chalkstones semi-columns) and around the light beneath the window of the church's north wall.

The original flat wooden ceiling was replaced by Gothic vaults around 1400-1450, while the walls of the church were increased by six brick shifts. In the period around 1500, there have been added four extensions to the original church. To the west was built a tower of the monastery with a common spiral staircase to the north. At the north side of the ship is a reputable chapel built by the monastery with single, non-passing, changing of the campsite.

The porch in front of the south door is of the monk stone and with very large camp stones in the east wall. The youngest of the extensions is Sakristiet, which completely covers the north side of the choir. It is a half-house, predominantly built by the camp stones with smooth gables of the monastery.

The "scarves" found on all parts of the church around the pebbles, except where the walls have emerged recently, must originate from this restoration, although they may have been made on the basis of existing tracks, as the technique itself is known to be known in the late Middle Ages. At the time of the restoration, the porch wall was re-walled, and the windows in the church got their current large and flat-curved shape.

Due to the lack of preservation paintings, it has been chosen to emphasize the simplicity of the church room and beautiful architecture with whitewashed walls and vaults.

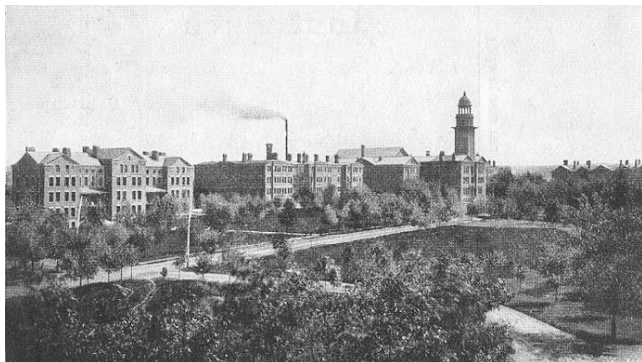

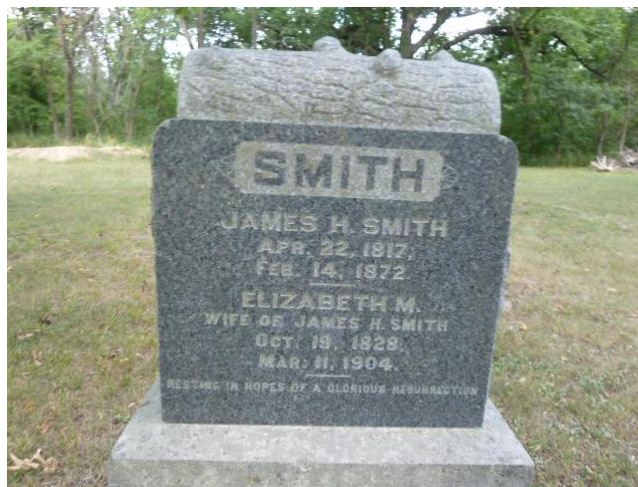

Mrs. Elizabeth Marshall Smith departed this life March 11, 1904 at the residence of her son-in-law, R.S. Lamar. After appropriate services by Rev. W. H. Burnham, Sunday afternoon, her remains were laid to rest beside her husband in the Dunlap burying ground. Some weeks ago she

Application of Granville Hudson Smith for war pension for Ex-Confederate Soldiers (1915). The purpose of the application was to certify those entitled to obtain permission under the terms of C.S.H.B. No. 465, 47th General Assembly as modified by Section 70a of the 48th General Assembly of Missouri. Granville received a pension of about 10 dollars per year.

In 1915 his residence was given as Fulton, MO. He enlisted in Company K, Woods Missouri Volunteer Cavalry Battalion in September 1864. Rank Private, and paroled at Shreveport LA on June 7, 1865 when the war ended. In his application he stated that he was never wounded, he was 69 years of age (born in 1845) and he fought at Vera Cruz MO and Brunswick MO.

S. Craig Smith Dead Farmer Passed Away at His Home Near Fulton After Short Illness.

Sidney Craig Smith, 60 years old, one of the well-known and highly esteemed farmers of Fulton community, died at his home on the Lamar lane, four miles northeast of Fulton at 6:45 p.m. Monday, after a short illness. Mr. Smith was taken suddenly ill last Friday and physicians pronounced his ailment valvular heart trouble, complicated by liver trouble. He had been to a neighbor's Friday morning and had eaten his dinner as usual Friday, apparently being in his usual good health. He was taken ill that afternoon.

Mr. Smith was born September 3, 1855, and the Smith family lived in Saline and Carroll counties before their removal to the Kingdom a number of years ago. They settled off the farm northeast of Fulton, where Mr. Smith was reared and which had been his home since. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. James Smith.

Mr. Smith was married about 15 years ago to Miss Belle Houchins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.L. Houchins, who with a little son, Sidney Crews Smith survived him. He is also survived by five brothers and three sisters as follows: George Smith of Faribault, Minn.; Mrs. P.C. Jensen of Albert Lee, Minn.; Mrs. James M. Bailey of Saskatchewan, Canada; Finnis Smith of North Dakota; Granville Smith, T.D. Smith, V.O. Smith and Mrs Robert Lamar of Fulton.

Mr. Smith was a successful farmer and a man well thought of in his community. He came of an old Callaway family his parents settling here many years ago, and during his long residence in his home locality won the confidence and esteem of his intimates. John Bethel Claybourn was born 24 December 1846 at Texico, Jefferson County, Illinois. In the Civil War he served the last six months with the 136th Illinois Volunteer Infantry.

On 4 July 1866, he married Mary Ellen Clink ("Ellen"), born 6 September 1848, in Van Wert County, Ohio. They celebrated the day by listening to addresses delivered by Generals Ulysses S. Grant and William T. Sherman at the Independence Day Celebration in Salem, Illinois. They lived for twelve years at Rome (Dix), Illinois where "Uncle John" was employed as a wagon maker. In July of 1878 he made a covered wagon, bought a span of mules and drove to Glenville, Minnesota, with his wife and four children where they located on a farm. The trip took them twenty-five days.

Roughly four years later, in 1882, they moved to a farm north of Albert Lea which is now the site of the Albert Lea Golf and Country Club. They lived there two years and then moved into town (Albert Lea) where "Uncle John," a carpenter and wheelright by trade, secured employment in the local wagon factory. With the exception of one year, the family lived at 204 South Pearl Street from 1885 on through John's death.

On 4 July 1936, John and Ellen celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary. The Albert Lea newspaper published their pictures, the above information about them, and stated that they were believed to be the oldest married couple in Minnesota.



"Mr. Claybourn will observe his 90th birthday next December 24th. He is in remarkably good health, has never used tobacco, coffee, tea or any intoxicating liquor, but drinks milk three times a day. He maintains a keen interest in modern affairs and is especially interested in political events. Recently, however, he's been busy supervising the shingling of the house he owns next door, climbing ladders and laying shingles.

"Mrs. Claybourn will be 88 years of age next September 6th. She, too, is enjoying good health and is of the opinion that life today is much better than it was when she was young. Both Mr. and Mrs. Claybourn claim that a successful marriage such as theirs has been is largely a matter of sacrifice and cooperation, and both declare that they believe no other couple that have been married half as long have had so few differences."

He died eight months after this celebration on 19 March 1937. "Aunt Ellen" died roughly three years later on 2 April 1940. Both are buried in Albert Lea, Minnesota.

John Bethel Claybourn, son of William D. and Francis Alice Claybourn, was born on a farm near Dix, Jefferson County, Illinois, December 24, 1846 and passed away at his home in Albert Lea, Minnesota, March 19, 1937 reaching an age of ninety years, two months and twenty-six days.

The Claybourns were a prominent English family tracing their history back to the 11th Century. The American branch of the family came over with the Capt. John Smith expedition in 1607 and founded Jamestown, Virginia. The main branch was identified with the south but there was also a line in the north so that in the civil war, brother faced brother in the desperate struggle.

On July 4, 1866 Mr. Claybourn was united in marriage to Ellen Clink and they continued to reside in Illinois until July, 1878 when they moved to a farm near Glenville, Minnesota. In 1887 they moved to Albert Lea where they continued to live until the time of his death. To this union nine children were born, two of whom died in childhood. This marriage has proven most remarkable in that this couple were approaching their seventy-first wedding anniversary. Maintaining for some time the record for the longest union in the state and one of the longest records in the entire country.

In 1864 Mr. Claybourn enlisted in the Union army under Captain C. Scott, Co. E. 136th Regiment, Illinois Infantry Volunteers and was honorably discharged at the close of the war.

By trade Mr. Claybourn was a wheel-right which craft he pursued for some years after coming to Albert Lea, later becoming a building contractor, constructing many buildings in this vicinity. Mr. Claybourn was a very active member of Robson Post No. 5, being one of the two last survivors of this post, the other being Comrade Gardner Loudon of Glenville.

During the ministry of Reverend Mosher, Mr. Claybourn became a member of the First Baptist church of this city, a relationship which he maintained until the time of his departure. For a number of years he served as a deacon and when advancing age made it necessary to limit his activity, he was made Deacon-Emeritas, and honor which he has held to the close of his career.

Funeral services were held at his home, 204 South Pearl street, the Reverend Chas. B. Stephens, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars officiating, military rites being held at the cemetery.

A mixed quartet sang "Face to Face" and "When the Roll Is Called up Yonder."

A few days ago she suffered a stroke and failed continuously until death came. Her husband, a Civil War veteran died march 19, 1937 at the age of ninety years.

Seven children survive: Wayne, Harry, Minnie, and Mort, all of Albert Lea; Leslie of Milwaukee, Mrs. Thomas of Crosby, Minn. And John of Panama. Minnie, who lived with her mother has been constantly at her bedside, caring for her both day and night. While her father was ill she was just as devoted to him.

Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Claybourn arrived in Albert Lea last evening. John flew from the Canal Zone to Miami, Fla. Yesterday, is now enroute from there to Albert Lea.

7. Mourten "Mort" Franklin Claybourn was born on 15 August 1881, in Glenville, Minnesota. He occasionally

spelled his name "Morton", but he was generally known simply as "Mort".

Mort married Nellie B. Hill (born 27 December 1884). Nellie's lineage has its own notable history. Nellie's mother, Ella, grew up on a large plantation with its typical palatial home owned by Nellie's grandfather (on her mother's side), Philip Echols. He was a broker and plantation owner.

The Echols' plantation was in the center of much of the upheaval of the Civil War as it lay in the direct path of Sherman's march to the sea and suffered the fate of the depredations of war. The home was taken by the Union and was converted into a hospital where Ella's mother (Nellie's grandmother), with the help of Negro slaves, cared for the wounded Union soldiers.

After the devastation of his holdings, Philip moved to Columbus, Nebraska, to start life anew. Once the family moved to Nebraska Ella met Charles L. Hill, who was engaged in educational work and bookbinding. They married and would go on to have eight children, including Nellie.

Mort and Nellie began spelling the name "Claybourne" due to a family feud in which Nellie thought a brother-in-law had wronged her; thereafter the family was split. Mort died on 14 December 1959 and Nellie followed roughly nine years later on 17 December 1968. They had seven children:



- a. Charles Franklin "Frank" Claybourne was born 7 July 1916, in Albert Lea, Minnesota. He learned his life's values growing up in Albert Lea where he was an Eagle Scout, delivered newspapers and graduated from Albert Lea High School in 1932. Frank received a B.B.A. degree in 1937 and an L.L.B. degree in 1943, both from the University of Minnesota. He married Ingrid Larsen, who was born on 17 January 1918 in Hawaii.

Her other great love was for dogs and, naturally, she would often read stories of canine heroes. Ruth was editor of the school newspaper and class valedictorian at Albert Lea High School Class in 1942.



Ruth's daughter Nell writes, "The most memorable day of her childhood came at age 13 when she was finally afforded much-needed prescription eyewear. Her entire world came alive in sharp detail." For years she had sat in the front of the class; she had squinted and waved at blurry passersby who called her name, and she had failed to distinguish the most basic elements of her visionary world due to acute astigmatism. Nell adds, "Her parents failed to respond earlier to her request for eyewear in keeping with their consistent favoritism displayed to their boys. She was never one to complain, but she revealed to me, her only daughter, that while she was growing

up, it was always, 'Mom's boys this and Mom's boys that.' Not until my grandma (Nellie) lay on her deathbed did she admit the error of favoring her sons when, 'it was you who always came through for me, Ruthie.'"

Ruth learned the classics at the knees of her maternal grandparents, Charles and Ella Hill who also resided in Albert Lea. The Sunday afternoons spent in their house afforded her a much-needed refuge from the teasing of her brothers. Here she read aloud the Greek classics, Whitman, Longfellow, Emerson, and nonfiction at the behest of her grandparents.

Ruth was not only bright, but attractive; however, she had no use for boys (since she had four teasing brothers) until she dated in college. Once on a date when a boy teased her by saying that men never make passes at girls who wear glasses, she replied glibly, "But girls who wear glasses, of men can make asses." Ruth did eventually marry, however, to Lucius Earl Woods ("Lew").



Lew was born in 1921 as the son of Henry Earl Woods (1883-1964) and Esther May Potter (1882-1950). Ruth's daughter Nell writes, "When she met my father, I believe she saw a soul mate at last. Indeed, my parents maintained a passion for each other right up until the end. He was so refreshingly different from her brothers - he was a gentleman, an intellectual, and an equal partner." She wrote to him on their 44th anniversary, the last one celebrated before she died: "Forty-four years ago I met and married the best of men, and you've never once let me down."

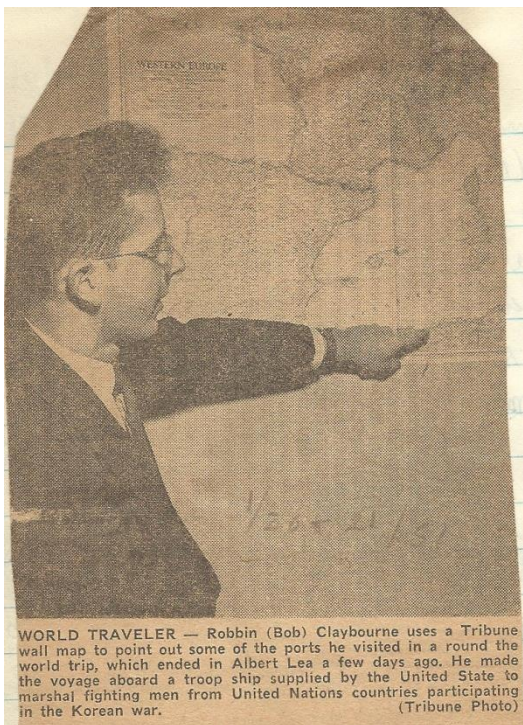
Ruth died on 25 March 1995 in Denver, Colorado, and Lew died just months later on 10 October 1995. They had three children:

He was Vice President of Kenosha (Wisc.) Printing & Carton Co. (1918) and later established Claybourne Process Corp. in Milwaukee, Wis. (1921). Shortly after, he designed the Claybourne multicolor press which printed from curved precision electrotype plates. The C.B. Cottrell & Sons Co. took over Claybourne's firm in 1937. Thereafter he was associated with several other printing firms. Over the years he patented over 200 printing processes. Leslie was a 32nd Degree Mason; member of the Laipoli Shrine; life member of International Pressman's and Assistant's Union; the Printing House Craftsmen's Club in Milwaukee and several other cities; member of the Milwaukee Athletic Club, the Illinois Athletic Club and the Lakeside Club - both of Chicago - and the Advertising Club of New York City. Throughout his life Leslie was considered a printing process pioneer.

Many in Albert Lea will remember LEX Claybourne, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Claybourne of this city. Since leaving Albert Lea he has progressed rapidly in the world of inventions. His latest creation is a five-color rotary equipment capable of printing 4,000 sheets per hour. Mr. Claybourne is the President of the Claybourne Corporation, manufacturers of the Claybourne Process Machinery, of Milwaukee (Wis. The... of the Editor and Publisher uses a page and a half, explaining this new wonder in printing machinery. The introductory paragraph of the article reads as follows:

The new Claybourne five-color rotary press with automatic feeder and delivery, capable of printing 4,000 sheets an hour of the finest four and five color work for magazines, labels and commercial work, has attracted ink and paper manufacturers as well as printers and publishers from all parts of the country to the Claybourne

Corporation at Milwaukee, Wis., during the past month to witness the demonstration of new multi-color press development.



Lex Claybourn was the moving force behind not only the proof press, but also a line of plate shavers for curved electrotypes, and proof presses for those plates, and the design for a 4 color rotary letterpress unit designed for magazine printing that used a single impression cylinder. He preached precision equipment for fast make-readies and lower costs. His company sold to the Cottrell Company located in Rhode Island in the 1930s, but press manufacture remained in Milwaukee. Cottrell continued to make these presses well into the 1950s. But by 1955 Lex, who was in his 70s, had fallen on hard times and ended up in a hospital paralyzed and penniless. A fund raising drive was started by his friends and the Inland Printer to help with his medical expenses.

He died on 10 December 1956, at the age of 73 years and is buried at Wisconsin's Memorial Park.

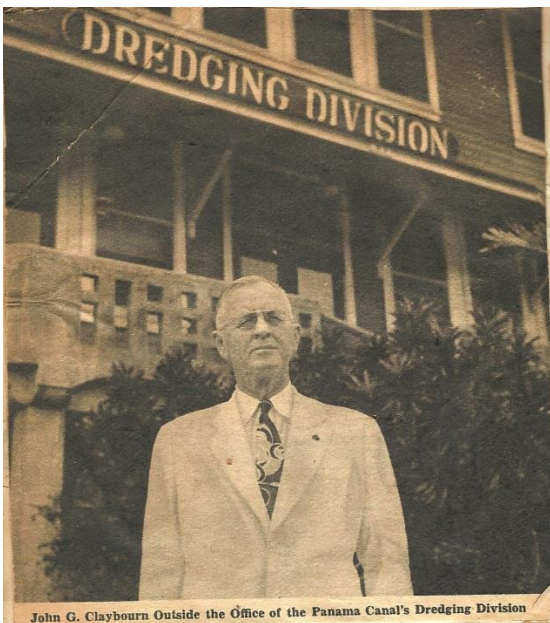

William Laws was born November 15, 1826 and died April 22, 1907, aged 80 years, 5 months and 7 days.

He was born in Todd county Kentucky, and came to Illinois with his parents, Fielding and Betsy Laws, in 1830, and settled in Bond County. In 1848 he was married to Miss Mary Marth McCaslin, after which he resided for a short time in Bond county, then coming to Montgomery county, settling on the farm on which he lived till his death.

To this union were born nine children: Sarah E. McLain, Thomas G, Lucinda Lewey, William H., Alfred Wilson. Mrs. Ellen Linders, Fielding Franklin, Albert P., and Chas. L.

His wife and four children preceded him. Three sons and two daughters were spared to comfort him in his declining years. Besides these he leaves 40 grand children, 18 great grand children and four brothers and one sister.

The subject of this sketch was a man of strong convictions with the courage to boldly assert them.

He was interested in the welfare of his neighbors and maintained an appreciation of the affairs of life to the last.

In his sickness he was always thoughtful of others, striving to make the burden of his care as light as possible.

When a young friend brought him game to tempt the weak and failing appetite he generously sent a part of it to a sick neighbor. When the family remonstrated, because they felt he needed it, he said-it was not the right spirit to keep it all himself, he wished to divide it with one who was sick and suffering as himself. He was converted in early years at old Bear Creek Camp Ground and while not demonstrative he has given us sufficient evidence by the life he left behind that his years have not been spent in vain and we who are younger would do well to try to live up to the example this hoary head has given us.

While the neighbors have lost a kind old neighbor and friend, it is the immediate family especially who will miss his counsel and advice.

To them we extend our deepest sympathy especially to the orphan granddaughter who has made it possible for him to

spend his last days in his old home.

The funeral services were held at the Presbyterian Church in Donnellson Tuesday, April 23, at 2 o'clock p. m., Rev, O.B. Lee assisted by Rev. Dunn officiating. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in Donnellson. The interment was in the Donnellson cemetery.
